

Throughout the year we hosted two boat parades, several marathons, community forums, neighborhood clean ups and celebrated major achievements within the department.


2021 did not come without its challenges.

CHIEF'S BUREAUS

CRIMINAL INTERLLIGENCE BUREAU

The Criminal Intelligence Bureau is comprised of three separate units: The Criminal Intelligence Unit, the Electronic Support Unit, and the Fraud Unit.

Criminal Intelligence Unit

This unit functions as a staff support service to the Tampa Police Department, and the law enforcement community in both tactical and strategic intelligence. The unit is responsible for gathering and analyzing information of any formally structured group involved in criminal activity and disseminating this information to the proper enforcement unit. They also oversee adult use issues, tracking these issues and work in conjunction with city licensing on adult entertainment and businesses that serve alcohol and provide assistance for the formulation of city ordinances that affect these businesses. The Intelligence Unit also assists in the protection of dignitaries visiting the City of Tampa as well as providing investigative and liaison services to the Executive Branch of the City of Tampa.

Electronic Unit

The Electronic Unit is responsible for making available to the investigator, highly technical and sophisticated state of the art electronic surveillance components. The unit provides an experienced technician trained to effectively obtain quality evidentiary audio and video recordings desired to successfully prosecute and convict criminal law violators. Additionally, this unit is responsible for the new CCTV system installed for the Republican National Convention, cell phones and the maintenance of building security at One Police Center, the three district offices and the communications center.

Fraud Unit

The Fraud unit is responsible for all long term fraud related cases. These include Identity Theft, Exploitation of the Elderly, Scams, Counterfeit Currency, Extortion and all member of the team work with the IRS to combat the ever growing Tax Fraud issue.



CHIEF'S BUREAUS

PROFESSIONAL STANDARDS BUREAU

The Professional Standards Bureau combines the department's crime reduction mission with accountability to the community.

LEGAL BUREAU

The Legal Bureau handles all legal matters concerning the administration and operation of the police department and responds to all requests for legal opinions. The Forfeiture Unit reports directly to the assistant city attorney, who serves as police legal advisor. Deterring criminal activity by depriving criminals of property used in or acquired through illegal activities is the primary responsibility of the Forfeiture Unit. The Legal Unit also files petitions for Risk Protection Orders for firearms.

MEDIA RELATIONS OFFICE

The mission of the Media Relations Office is to ensure the media and citizens have access to information and records from the Tampa Police Department. By ensuring this free flow of information, the department educates the public on how officers are working to reduce crime and improve the citizens' quality of life.


HIGHLIGHT: BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

Mayor Jane Castor established the Mayor's Community Task Force on Policing for local leaders, activists, and subject-matter experts to have important conversations and collaborate about improving the Tampa Police Department and strengthening its relationship with the community. University of South Florida Associate Criminology Professor, Dr. Bryanna Fox, led the group meetings that focused on the future of policing in Tampa. The group used five pillars of the 21st Century Policing as their framework and identified 17 key findings to enhance the Tampa Police Department. One of the recommendations was to "hire trained mental health experts and social workers to co-respond to mental health-related or social welfare calls."

Immediately, the Tampa Police Department went to work to research and create a Behavioral Health Unit. Each team consist of a sworn law enforcement officer and a licensed mental health professional. The mental health professional and the law enforcement officer will respond together to behavioral health related calls. While the officer and the mental health professional will work together as a team, the mental health professional will take the lead role on behavioral health related calls.

The major goals of the program are to reduce the number of calls for service that our patrol officers respond to related to behavioral health, reduce recidivism of Baker Acts, prevent unnecessary incarceration and/or hospitalization of individuals in crisis and to reduce deadly force encounters with individuals that are experiencing a behavioral health crisis.





DISTRICT TWO


BUSCH GARDENS AREA, UNIVERSITY OF SOUTH FLORIDA AND NEW TAMPA

HIGHLIGHT: COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP AND ENGAGEMENT SQUAD

The Tampa Police Department Community Partnership and Engagement (C.P.E.) Squad was implemented in 2021 to enhance the relationship between the agency and the community they serve. This squad works to establish partnerships between community members, neighborhood leaders and local businesses to improve the community.

The C.P.E. Squad currently operates out of the Police Athletic League (P.A.L.) building, located in District Two at 1924 E. Diana St. The squad engages the community and provides helpful information such as crime prevention, how to establish and maintain a neighborhood watch program, and provides demonstrations on how to install child car seats. C.P.E. is also active with Big Brothers Big Sisters programs, P.A.L. youth sports activities, Tampa Night Out and other special events to address the needs of the community we serve.

The squad also hosts numerous community events with the help of community partners.






DISTRICT THREE

EAST TAMPA, THE YBOR CITY AREA AND PORT OF TAMPA

HIGHLIGHT: THE LAUNDRY PROJECT

The Tampa Police Department has partnered with Current Initiatives, a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization, on their Laundry Project initiative for several years. In 2021, District Three officers made it a mission to host the event once a month, at various laundromats. With the help of Rise Tampa, Our Police Foundation, enough funds were raised to help families wash clothes for free.

The Laundry Project assists lower-income families with meeting a basic need to wash clothes and linens, by turning laundromats into community centers of hope. Laundry fees are paid for while volunteers assist with laundry services, entertain children, and create a caring space.





CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION - MAJOR CRIMES BUREAU

CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The Criminal Investigations Division oversees all long term, latent investigations allowing uniform patrol officers to focus on day-to-day operations. It is comprised of the Major Crimes Bureau and the Violent Crimes Bureau.

The Major Crimes Bureau investigates Homicides, Sex Crimes, Child Abuse, Internet Crimes Against Children, and Fugitive Apprehension. The bureau also handles forensic investigations.

The Cyber Crimes Squad is part of the Major Crimes Bureau, and investigates Internet Crimes Against Children as part of the ICAC Task Force. ICAC investigators use specialized equipment and training to investigate and prevent the online exploitation of children.

Detectives with the Major Crimes Bureau are also responsible for conducting long-term investigations and operations aimed at combatting Human Trafficking, a form of modern-day slavery.

The **Violent Crimes Bureau** is responsible for Narcotic and Gang Enforcement, Undercover Operations, and Firearm Investigations.





CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION - MAJOR CRIMES BUREAU

The **Support Services Division** includes Personnel, Police Reserves, Training, Evidence Control, Supply, Records, Extra Duty Office, Fleet Management, Honor Guard, Chaplains, Police Explorers & Police Athletic League.

The Support Services Division also includes the **Communications Bureau** which is central to the police function. Every call for police service must be received, recorded, dispatched and concluded by this area. The bureau is the vital link between citizens requiring police services, and the officers who respond to the event.

CITIZEN'S ACADEMY



TPD held a Citizen's Academy on Dec 14, 2021. We had 12 citizens attend and graduate the academy. This was the first academy since 2019 as the 2020 academy was cancelled due to COVID-19.



SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

SPECIAL OPERATIONS DIVISION

The Special Operations Division augments the patrol function with personnel strength associated with special event planning and special team deployment necessary to completely serve the varying needs of our community.

This division which includes operations of the Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) Team; Hostage Negotiation Team (HNT); Explosives Ordinance Disposal (EOD) Team; Underwater Search and Recovery Team; Crowd Management Group; Bicycle Operations and Response Unit; Canine Unit; Mounted Patrol Unit; Traffic Unit; Traffic Homicide; DUI Unit; Aviation Unit; Marine Unit; Honor Guard; Special Incident Management Unit (SIMU); Urban Area Security Initiatives (UASI), and Homeland Security functions.





Master Patrol Officer Bridget Coyman and K9 Jagger have been working together for 6 years. MPO Coyman and the 7-year-old Belgian Malinois and German Shepherd mix breed make a great team. During the month of November 2021, K9 Jagger and MPO Coyman attended a K-9 detection seminar in Daytona Beach. There were 126 K-9 detection teams in attendance from all over the United States. The 3-day seminar consisted of training for narcotics and explosives in different areas throughout the city and county. Each day different training scenarios were set up by nationally recognized K-9 trainers. All the K-9 teams were evaluated daily by the trainers on their detection skills, and their ability to work together as a K-9 team. At the conclusion of the seminar, the trainers selected the top K-9 teams. K-9 Jagger and MPO Coyman placed 2nd overall.

The mission of the Tampa Police Department's Horsemanship program is to have a positive impact on relationships between police and the community. The program aims to give children in the community an opportunity to be exposed to and work with horses while helping to build positive relationships with police.






NIBRS

NATIONAL INCIDENT-BASED REPORTING SYSTEM

NIBRS-In accordance with state and federal mandates, the Tampa Police Department, has changed the way it reports crime to the State of Florida and the FBI. The Tampa Police Department, along with all agencies across the state and country, has shifted its Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) methodology from Summary Reporting System (SRS) to the National Incident Based Reporting System (NIBRS) in 2021.

NIBRS captures many additional details on each single crime incident, as well as on separate offenses within the same incident. Unlike SRS which was an aggregate monthly tally of crimes NIBRS goes much deeper into each incident and provides more information about those crimes. While the Tampa Police Department is excited about the new methodology, which provides additional details and transparency to the public, it unfortunately does not directly compare to crime data previously captured.





IN REMEMBRANCE

MASTER PATROL OFFICER JESSE MADSEN



Master Police Officer Jesse Madsen was killed in the early hours of March 9, 2021, when his police vehicle was struck by a wrong way driver on Interstate 275.

Just before 1:00 AM on Tuesday morning, Tampa Police began receiving calls about a white vehicle driving southbound in the northbound lanes of I275 at a high rate of speed and swerving through the lanes. Within one minute of the original call, the white sedan crashed into Officer Madsen's police vehicle between the Hillsborough and Sligh Avenue exits. The impact killed both Jesse and the driver of the white sedan. Jesse moved his police vehicle into the path of the wrong-way driver to save the lives of others.

Jesse Madsen, 45, has a wife and three children: a 16-year-old son, a 12-year-old son, and a 10-year-old daughter. He dedicated his life to the safety and service of others – as a United States Marine combat veteran, as a Police Officer in Lyndhurst, Ohio, and as a Police Officer in Shaker Heights, Ohio. For 16 and a half years, Jesse served proudly as a Tampa Police Officer and is an eight-time recipient of the Tampa Police Department's Life-Saving Award.

Jesse's badge, number 507, is retired and his name is etched for eternity into the Tampa Police Fallen Officers Memorial. He is the 32nd Tampa Police Officer to make the ultimate sacrifice. He will never be forgotten.

Matthew S. Coleman Officer Coleman passed away following complications from COVID-19 on September 15. He was 37 years old.


